

Garner, John. Recreation and Sports Ministry: Impacting Postmodern Culture. Nashville: Broadman & Holman Publishers, 2003.

Explains how the popularity of recreation and sports in today's culture presents an opportunity for the church to capture the minds and imaginations of people, presenting essays on such topics as the ethics of competition and the sports minister profession.

Hoffman, Shirl. Sport and Religion. Champaign: Human Kinetics, 1992.

Shirl Hoffman creatively divides this book into four different parts: Sport as Religion, Sport as Religious Experience, Religion in Sport, and Sport Religion, and Ethics. The book references sport sociology, sport psychology, and cultural and religious studies.

Ladd, Tony and James A. Mathisen. Muscular Christianity: Evangelical Protestants and the Development of American Sport. Grand Rapids: Baker Books, 2002.

This book gives background into the relationship between sport and evangelism beginning in the 19th century.

Oswald, Roger. Equipping and Sending Athletes and Mission Teams to the Mission Field. Church Sports International

A manual designed to help the local church understand how to develop a program, disciple the people, and prepare them for ministry in another culture.

Oswald, Roger. Evangelistic Sports Clinics. Church Sports International, 2003.

How to use the multi-day sports camp or the one-day sports clinic as a way to introduce the gospel and/or teach spiritual principles. Included is a complete planning guide.

Oswald, Roger. Sports Ministry and the Church. Church Sports International, 2002.

Presented here is a philosophy of sports ministry based on biblical principles. It addresses the question: "Why should a church have a sports ministry?" It identifies the variety of ways a sports ministry can serve the church and includes an examination of the obstacles for starting a sports ministry.

Oswald, Roger. Starting a Sports Ministry in the Local Church. Church Sports International

This manual provides the sequential steps to initiate a sports ministry in the local church. In addition to discussing the issues, an extensive appendix supplies examples, sample forms and procedural check lists.

Putney, Clifford. Muscular Christianity: Manhood and Sports in Protestant America, 1880-1920. Cambridge: Harvard University Press, 2001.

The notion of Muscular Christianity was an important feature of some key discourses around work with boys and men in the second half of the nineteenth century. Here Clifford Putney explores the origin and use of the term. (infed.org)
